Countless children have good vision today that otherwise would not have had, were it not for his great work. Much of this was reflected in the thousands of condolence messages that his family received from colleagues, friends and patients. May he Rest in Peace.

The focus of discussion was on eyelid, lacrimal and orbital conditions with a grand rounds session led by ICO President, Mr Tim Fulcher and a panel of experts including Prof. Timothy Sullivan, Professor of Ophthalmology, University of Queensland, Australia, Ms Elizabeth McElnea, Consultant Ophthalmic Surgeon, University Hospital Galway, Mr Michéal O'Rourke, Consultant Ophthalmic Surgeon, Royal Victoria Eye and Ear Hospital, and Mr Gerry Fahy, Galway Clinic.

An interactive Q&A session with the panel was based on a series of clinical cases on a range of eyelid, lacrimal and orbital conditions and the management of complexities in this area, presented by ICO Surgical Trainees Dr. Aaron Donnelly and Dr. Liam Mulcahy.

The meeting also included podium presentations, chaired by

Prof Colm O'Brien, Miss Yvonne Delaney and Ms Janice Brady, and a virtual poster exhibition featuring research projects, audits and case reviews being conducted in ophtha-Imology across Ireland and in the UK.

## Annual Montgomery Lecture *"2022: An Orbital Odyssey"*

It was a great honour for the College to welcome Prof Timothy Sullivan, a specialist in paediatric and adult eyelid disorders, lacrimal and orbital disease, to Ireland to present the Annual Montgomery Lecture that evening at The Albert Lecture Theatre, RCSI.

His lecture entitled "2022: An Orbital Odyssey" highlighted advances in the management of orbital diseases over the years through improvements in imaging, diagnostics and treatment resulting in better outcomes for patients.

2022 marked the 106th year of the Annual Montgomery Lecture. The establishment of the Lecture in 1916 was of great significance to the specialty of ophthalmology in Ireland. Dr Robert Montgomery served as an ophthalmic surgeon to St Mark's Hospital and the Royal Victoria Eye and Ear Hospital until his passing in 1912.

The Montgomery Lecture was the first medical lecture to be founded in Trinity College Dublin and the inaugural lecture was presented by Dr Euphan Maxwell in 1916 on the subject of "Diagnosis in Uveitis".

### National Education Series Meeting

The ICO, in collaboration with the National Clinical Programme for Ophthalmology, will host a meeting for the Integrated Eye Care Team on Thursday, 30th of March

The meeting will take place from 10am - 12pm at the Education and Learning Centre, Royal Victoria Eye and Ear Hospital, Dublin.

The session is part of the National Education Series coordinated by the ICO and National Clinical Programme for Ophthalmology in support of the implementation of the new Integrated Eye Care Teams which is extending the delivery of specialist ophthalmic care in the non-acute setting.

Delegates will hear an update on the continued reconfiguration of adult and children's eye care service delivery, as guided by the National Clinical Programme for Ophthalmology Model of Care. Clinical Lead, Prof Billy Power, will chair the session with talks from Dr Margaret Morgan and Dr Olya Scannell.

Registration is complimentary for ICO members and members of the HSE integrated eye care team and management.

## Professional Competence: New Framework proposed by the Medical Council

The Medical Council has proposed new Professional Competence Rules & Guidelines based on research into best international practice and following consultation with registered medical practitioners and other key stakeholders.

## Once approved, the new guidelines will come into effect in May 2024. A public consultation is now being held to obtain a broad range of feedback from you on the revised Rules and Guidelines.

The majority of changes relate to the CPD categories. Once enrolled, registered medical practitioners must engage in and record 50 hours of CPD activity annually. There are four broad categories of CPD proposed with the breakdown of hours per category outlined below:

 PLANNING CPD - UP TO 5 HOURS
3 Stages: Plan, Peer Review, Reflection - templates will be provided Intended as professional development tool and is self-directed
RACTICE REVIEW - MIN OF 10 HOURS Audit, quality improvement, and/or practice evaluation
WORK-BASED LEARNING - MIN OF 15 HOUR Reflective learning from clinical and non-clinical work

**ACCREDITED CONTINUED EDUCATION** - MIN OF 20 HOURS xternal to the workplace - local, national & international

The (i) PCS Plan, (ii) Peer Review of your Plan and (iii) End of Year Reflection for the Planning CPD category are selfdirected and are not viewed by the Medical Council. The templates will be built into the new online PCS account and will be the record that you participated in the activity of planning. The draft guidelines provide greater detail on the four categories as well as a list of examples for each category in the appendices.

## You will also find updated information in the guidelines on:

- Requirements for registered medical practitioners not engaged in the practice of medicine
- Pro Rata CPD Activity in situations such as:
  - Leave (maternity, parental, carers, adoptive leave, or other forms of statutory leave and illness)
  - Newly registered medical

practitioner or practitioners restored to the register

- Registered medical practitioners who relocate to the Ireland during the Scheme year
- Overseas Requirements
- Monitoring of CPD

The PCS Online Account will be developed to reflect the changes ratified for the new PCS framework and we will ensure all those enrolled will receive support in transitioning to the new online account. We will also ensure that you are updated throughout the next PCS year (commencing May 2023) so that you will be ready to engage in the new PCS framework.

## Professional Competence: ICO Clinical Practice Audit 2022/23

ICO Members have been notified of two suggestions for the ICO Clinical Practice Audit 2022/23:

A) Your Patient Age Trends over the Last 10 Years

Review the age profile of patients attending your practice over the last 10 years using the parameters below:

- Record the ages of 50 patients seen in the last 6 months of 2012 (1st July - 31st Dec 2012)
- Record the ages of 50 patients seen in the last 6 months of 2022 (1st July - 31st Dec 2022)

Or

B) Average Distance Travelled from your Patients Home to your Practice

Review the average distance travelled by patients from their home to your practice over the last 10 years using the parameters below:

- Record the average distance that 50 patients travelled from their home to your practice during the last 6 months of 2012 (1st July -31st Dec 2012)
- Record the average distance that 50 patients travelled from their home to your practice during the last 6 months of 2022 (1st July -31st Dec 2022)

The ICO has shared the link with PCS members to record the details of your audit when it is complete for PCS purposes. The deadline for recording the audit is 30th April which is the last day of the current PCS year. The ICO will then upload the audit credit to your PCS Online Account.

#### **Annual Mooney Lecture 2023**

Professor David Garway-Heath, Consultant Ophthalmic Surgeon at Moorfields Eye Hospital London will present the Annual Mooney Lecture at the ICO Conference.

Prof Garway-Heath was the principal investigator of the UK glaucoma treatment study, a landmark trial in glaucoma management and the first trial in glaucoma to be published in The Lancet.

He is the inventor of the anatomical map (known as the 'Garway-Heath map') used worldwide in research in structure-function relationship in glaucoma and of the Moorfields regression Analysis algorithm for one of the earliest imaging diagnostic devices contributing to the worldwide use of imaging in the clinic.

He is Past President of the European Glaucoma Society and Vice President of the International Imaging and Perimetry Society. We have no doubt it will be a fascinating lecture.

## RCSI Charter Meeting 2022 Parallel Ophthalmic Session

The Royal College of Surgeons in Ireland held its annual Charter Day meeting from January 28th to February 3rd with the Ophthalmology Parallel session taking place on the latter.

In keeping with its setting in the beautifully appointed Royal College of Surgeons in Ireland building at 26 York Street, home of the National Surgical and Clinical Skills Centre, the meeting was designed to provide three comprehensive, informative presentations aimed at trainees in Ophthalmology and addressing topics important in surgical Ophthalmology. The session was chaired by Ms. Elizabeth McElnea from University Hospital Galway and Mr. Gerry Fahy who currently works in the Galway Clinic.

Mr. Michéal O'Rourke from the Royal Victoria Eye and Ear Hospital and Children's Health Ireland at Crumlin delivered a rousing presentation 'The Surgical Management of Exposure Keratopathy' replete with fantastic clinical images identifying the plethora of often very challenging conditions that can produce exposure keratopathy.

Ms. Aine Ni Mhealoid who works at University Hospital Waterford followed with a review 'Ophthalmic Surgery for Neuro-Ophthalmology' in which she detailed surgical approaches to the management of idiopathic intracranial hypertension, addressed potential nonsurgical alternatives to strabismus surgery and highlighted the potential future role for intervention in patients Leber's hereditary with optic neuropathy. Her presentation promoted excellent debate on the role of optic nerve sheath fenestration in idiopathic intracranial hypertension, a condition in which she has a particular interest.

Ms. Elizabeth McElnea finished with a summary of the indications for surgical intervention in patients with orbital cellulitis and in particular subperiosteal abscess associated with the same – 'Orbital Infection - The Who, What and When of Surgical Intervention'. The audience – both Consultants and trainees in Ophthalmology contributed their recent experiences of managing, in particular, orbital cellulitis in paediatric patients.
